Session Three:	Opportunity or Challenge?: Intercultural Competence Development of International Students in Virtual Meeting Spaces The U.S. has been one of the most prevailing destinations for international students for decades. However, recent shifts like the adoption of new teaching and learning technologies due to COVID-19 as well as uncertainties surrounding travel restrictions due to regional and international politics have prompted international educators to explore innovative ways for international students to engage in American higher education virtually without traveling to the U.S. Therefore, this presentation will focus on one of the issues — the intercultural competence development of international students enrolled at American higher education institutions — in the middle of a series of changes and uncertainties. It aims to understand how international students have achieved intercultural competence in a virtual learning environment; in other words, to determine whether the processes and outcomes of their intercultural competence development are similar between traditional faceto-face learning and virtual learning environments.
